Themes and challenges

Accelerating Decarbonisation

Fuel Poverty -155,000 (12%) of households currently live under fuel poverty in Wales

Smart Local Energy Systems- Using smart tech to join supply, demand (electricity, heat, transport) and storage Energy efficiency of buildings- Wales has some of the oldest and least thermally efficient housing stock in the UK and Europe.

Renewable energy generation, storage, local energy markets and P2P energy trading - emergent localised energy markets can offer new choices to consumers, enhance competition.

Behaviour change around carbon reduction - Wales's commitments on carbon reduction are mostly on the demand side. Wales also has higher overall per-capita emissions than the UK's overall.

Land use Landcover Change and Forestry (LULCF) - Inclusion of peatland emissions in An effective and cohesive approach is required for afforestation, peatland restoration and change in agricultural practice.

Transport Decarbonisation - Surface transport is one of the biggest emission sources in the country.









Themes and challenges









Supportive Communities

Public Participation and Democratisation – including participatory budgeting, citizen assemblies, citizen science, and the co-production of services and forms of public-community collaborations.

Community Wealth Building and the Foundational Economy - the infrastructure of everyday life (e.g. food, care (social and health), housing, energy, education, but also material infrastructure such as utility systems), yet it is often under-funded and under-staffed and completely overlooked in orthodox economic thinking. It is the perfect place for experimentation in Community Wealth Building (CWB),

Community Power and Asset-Based Community

Development - ABCD approach flips this, to explore

"what's strong, not what's wrong". In doing so, it aims to
build upon the assets of communities the people and the
social relations within a place

Social Justice - equal rights, opportunities, and treatment within a society. This can be economic, social, cultural, etc.

Adaption Lab

Information and tools to help us understand how to adopt and adapt innovations successfully to suit our context and needs.

Data Lab

Tools to help ask 'good data questions'. The importance of data ethics, the different types of data, and how these can help inform decision making.

The possibilities when applying data science techniques.

Procurement Lab

Maximise the impact of public spending to achieve broader strategic goals. Provide tools and techniques that can be used by *anyone* in an organisation to ensure the greatest 'value' is achieved when commissioning or purchasing goods and services.

Framing the problem, ask the right questions. Learn who is doing what? Where? and how it worked? Explore how it could work here.




Cohort Alpha

7 Local Authorities, 13 officers completed

The officers are in a position to be able to influence change, innovation, and improvement from group leaders and Heads of service through to operational leads. From a range of areas including Policy, Employment and Skills, Climate Change Response, Economy, Data, Regeneration, Energy, Community Learning and Engagement, Digital Innovation, Green Infrastructure.

The Challenges Cohort Alpha worked on - case studies here









Cohort One

36 registrations resulted in 29 associates 9 of the 10 local authorities involved.

So far challenges include:

- Town centres are dying, how do we save them? What does a thriving town centre look like in 5 years?
- How to increase the sustainable production and supply of locally grown food, what part does technology play?
- Can a carbon dashboard, broken down by emissions category, help us to better understand and reach our carbon emission goals?
- Care Deserts; how to develop an effective implementation and evaluation plan to resolve our care crisis?
- How do we improve the life outcomes and choices of residents who use day services?
