#### **Definition of co-production**

Co-production (of public services) means that people who provide and deliver services, and people who access and receive services, share power and responsibility, and work together for mutual benefit in equal, reciprocal and caring relationships.



#### It enables:

- people to access relevant and meaningful support when they need it;
- services to be effective and make a positive difference in people's lives; and
- people, services and communities to become more effective agents of change.

#### What co-production is (and isn't)

Co-production exists at the intersection of people (citizens, service users) and professionals (public service organisations, government).

"If you're not at the table, then you're on the menu."

In co-production, people are a part of the decisions that will affect their lives.

"Nothing about me, without me."



#### **Definition of involvement**

Involvement requires organisations to be open to influence from citizens and stakeholders, moving to a culture of **'working with' rather than 'doing to'**. In contrast to consultation, involvement approaches work with people at earlier stages, such as helping to identify issues and potential solutions, and being supported to remain involved right throughout design, implementation and evaluation processes.
