This new legislation aims to make it simpler and easier to rent a home, replacing the various and complex pieces of existing tenancy legislation with one clear legal framework. Simon will give delegates an update on the expected that implementation of the Act, which will take the form of a 'big bang' rollout, with current tenancies in Wales automatically converting to the appropriate new contract under the Act
