	Dutch housing associations want to achieve a carbon neutral energy supply in their stock by 2050. Aedes, the Dutch branch organisation, developed a strategic tool with 4 scenarios how to reach this goal. The fact that 90% of our almost 300 members filled it in gives us a thorough image of our ambitions. On the tactical and operational level it is evident to choose an approach in which the transformation of our stock, the regional energy transition and the affordability for our tenants comes together.

In this session James will share his experience in working on projects:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Parc Eirin – 225 homes in Tonyrefail – which is the largest scheme to date supported under the Welsh Government Innovative Housing programme. • Penderry Retrofit – the retrofit of 644 homes (all social housing) in Swansea with PV, battery storage and intelligent controls to address fuel poverty and community energy generation. <p>James will outline how innovative homes can go further and compliment the transition to clean energy on the grid network whilst driving energy costs down for residents.</p>
